




Reopen Boston Fund - Get Up to \$2,000 for PPE for Your Small Business

The \$6MM Reopen Boston Fund will help small businesses put in place the necessary public health guidance requirements needed to reopen like purchasing PPE, installing safety partitions, and managing outdoor spaces approved for use.

Applications for businesses will open on **Thursday, May 28, at 5 p.m.** and will be reviewed and approved on a rolling basis. It is important that you have (1) proof of your commercial address, (2) have a Vendor ID form the City BEFORE you apply, (3) complete the mandatory budget template.

You don't have to have a vendor ID to submit your application but you will need one to receive your payment.

CDC Reopening Guidelines for Cleaning and Disinfecting Public Spaces, Workplaces, Businesses, Schools and Homes

This guidance is intended for all Americans, whether you own a business, run a school, or want to ensure the cleanliness and safety of your home. Reopening America requires all of us to move forward together by practicing social distancing and other <u>daily habits</u> to reduce our risk of exposure to the virus that causes COVID-19.

Reopening the country also strongly relies on public health strategies, including increased testing of people for the virus, social distancing, isolation, and keeping track of how someone infected might have infected other people. This plan is part of the larger <u>United States Government plan</u> and focuses on cleaning and disinfecting public spaces, workplaces, businesses, schools, and can also be applied to your home.

protective gear and cleaning supplies needed to safely and responsibly operate.



2020 Census

We are reminding residents to take the 2020 Census during this time of physical distancing. To date, close to 50% of households have responded, which is lower than the statewide average response rate of 64.4%. We need to increase the rate of response.

- Much of the funding that comes from the Census count helps the most vulnerable among us. It provides, for instance, health care (Medicare and Medicaid), public education (grants for special education and Boston Public Schools), food and nutrition programs (SNAP and free school breakfast/lunch programs), affordable housing (Section 8 vouchers), and child care (Head Start) for low-income families.
- The 2020 Census is a way to directly increase community power. It will impact our daily lives for the next 10 years. Many of Boston's communities are at risk of an undercount. We need a complete and accurate count because all of Boston deserves to be seen, heard, and invested in.
- The Census has never been more accessible. You can respond to the <u>2020 Census</u> <u>online</u>, over the phone, or by mail. You can respond to the 2020 Census online or over the phone in 13 different languages.



DS4SI's New Book is Online!

With this simple premise, DS4SI makes the case for *arrangements* as a rich and overlooked terrain for social justice and world building. - We will test you for COVID-19 if you have fever, cough, or trouble breathing. You should also tell us about chills, shakes, muscle aches, headaches, and sore throat, or if you can't smell or taste.
- If you have a health condition such as asthma, chronic lung disease, diabetes, extreme obesity, cirrhosis of the liver, heart condition, other health conditions or a physician's order, we will take care of you.

What is P-EBT?

The *Pandemic - Electronic Benefits Transfer* (P-EBT) Program is additional money

- Families will get \$5.70 per child per day for every day school is closed
 Using P-EBT does NOT impact you or your child's immigration status. The
- Use P-EBT with grab and go student meal sites

Attention all families with school-aged children!

Be on the lookout for a Pandemic EBT benefit coming your way! P-EBT is a food benefit that supports families and students during school closure due to COVID-19. This includes any student in a school that provides free or reduced meals to all students. Boston Public Schools (BPS) and Charter schools serve free meals so all BPS and Charter School students will receive this benefit. Families do not need to do anything to receive this Pandemic EBT card and there are no applications required.

Families will get \$5.70 per student per day for every day school is closed to buy food. Families receiving DTA benefits will get their benefits on their existing EBT card. Families not currently receiving DTA benefits will be mailed a new P-EBT card.

NOTE: Using P-EBT benefits does not impact your or your child's immigration status. The Public Charge rule does not apply to P-EBT benefits.

NEXT STEPS:

Look for a notice in the mail from the Department of Transitional Assistance (DTA) in May. Families not receiving DTA benefits will get mailed their card separately from the notice. If you have not got your card by late May, call Project Bread's FoodSource hotline at 800-645-8333.

Received your card? Set it up now!

- 1. Call Massachusetts' EBT hotline (800) 997-2555
- 2. Create a PIN: use the last 4 digits of your child's case number that was provided on the notice you got in the mail and the child's date of birth (using the 2 digit month + 2 digit day. Example: 04/06)
- 3. Use like an EBT card for purchasing groceries from approved retailers!

Where can P-EBT be used?

P-EBT can be used anywhere that SNAP is accepted, such as grocery stores or smaller corner stores (look for signs that say "We accept EBT here")

What can be purchased with P-EBT?

P-EBT acts similarly to SNAP benefits

Can purchase:

- Most fresh, canned, frozen foods such as:
- Fresh fruits and vegetables
- Meat, dairy, and eggs
- Canned fruits and vegetables
- · Rice, beans, and dry goods
- Seeds to grow your own plants

Cannot purchase:

- Diapers, cleaning products, paper goods (toilet paper, paper towels, etc.), supplements/medicine
- Prepared meals sold hot and ready to eat or restaurant food
- Pet food
- Alcohol or recreational marijuana

ProtectMA.com will roll out in three phases:

Phase 2 I <u>Create</u> a commerce system to establish an online marketplace to allow for the purchase and sale of said products.

Phase 3 I Coordinate the delivery of PPE products to their proper destination.
